

Dear friends,

#### The Coronation of King Charles III

On the 6<sup>th</sup> of May His Majesty King Charles III will be crowned alongside Camilla, The Queen Consort, in Westminster Abbey. How can we pray for him, as he approaches this important event? Paul says: 'I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.' (1 Timothy 2:1,2).

For God's presence – to guide every aspect of King Charles' life as he prepares for his Coronation and future roles. At his Accession, he was proclaimed Defender of the Faith, the Supreme Governor of the Church of England. For God's love – to strengthen all relationships within the Royal Family; for reconciliation, understanding, forgiveness and good communication.



## Christian Aid Week May 14<sup>th</sup> – 20<sup>th</sup>

This year has seen Christian Aid and many other charities working harder than ever to bring help to people affected by natural disasters, famine, poverty, disease and conflict in many parts of the world. For example, the earthquakes in Turkey and Syria, the floods in Pakistan, famine in East Africa and a 34-day cyclone in Malawi and Mozambique, just to name a few

Christian Aid exists to create a world in which people can live a full life, free from poverty.

In 2021-2022 they reached 1.4 million people in need through their humanitarian programmes, carried out 257 projects in 14 countries, and £7 million was raised by their supporters to be used in humanitarian programmes.

Can we, as a church, do anything to help Christian Aid raise much needed funds to help again this year? Here are some suggestions:

- (a)we could have a specific fundraising page for Holy Trinity Church;
- (b) we could order some church collection envelopes;
- (c) we could order some delivery-only envelopes with a slip telling people where to take or send their envelopes;
- (d) we could have a house to house collection.

#### **COUNTDOWN TO THE CORONATION**

#### Of His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen Consort.

On Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May the Coronation will take place.

It is based on a solemn religious ceremony which has remained largely unchanged for more than 1,000 years. For the past 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, and is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

King Charles III will be crowned, and then in a similar, but simpler ceremony at the same service, the Queen Consort will also be crowned.

From 6<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> May Coronation Big Lunches will be held up and down

the U.K., and also across the Commonwealth.

On Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> May a Coronation Concert will be held at Windsor Castle, with iconic locations across the U.K. lit up using projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations.

On Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May there is a special Bank Holiday, giving everyone the opportunity to join in with their communities and good causes through Big Help Out activities. (More details at:

### Coronation Day – Saturday the 6<sup>th</sup> of May

**6:00 a.m.**: Coronation viewing areas will open along the main procession route.

**7:15 a.m.**: Westminster Abbey guests will begin arriving at security checkpoints in Victoria Tower Gardens.

9:00 a.m.: The congregation will be seated inside Westminster Abbey.

**9:30 a.m. –10:45 a.m.:** Coronation guests, including the royal family, heads of state and former prime ministers are scheduled to arrive.

**9:45 a.m.**: The Sovereign's Escort of the Household Cavalry will prepare to assemble for the King's Procession from Buckingham Palace.

**10:20 a.m.**: The King and Queen will travel from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey in the Diamond Jubilee State Coach.

11:00 a.m.: The main event, the coronation, will take place.

After his coronation, a brief ceremony will see Camilla be crowned as Queen after homage has been paid to the King.

**1:00 p.m.**: The coronation procession is expected to begin as the royals return from Westminster Abbey to Buckingham Palace, with almost 4,000 military personnel expected to be involved.

**1:45 p.m.**: The Royal Salute will see the King and Queen be saluted on the West Terrace of Buckingham Palace's garden, after which the military personnel present will give three cheers.

**2:15 p.m.**: 15 members of the royal family will gather on the balcony of Buckingham Palace for the fly-past which will pay homage to Charles and Camilla.

He is a qualified pilot and diver.





**Churchwardens**: Michael Forsdike and Peter Jones


**Deanery Synod Members**: Michael Forsdike and Peter Greenman.

- He is the first monarch in British history to have earned a university degree. From 1967 to 1970 he studied history at Cambridge University.
- He can speak Welsh. He spent two months learning the language in 1969, as he prepared to become the Prince of Wales. He still speaks it today.
- He is a qualified pilot and diver. While serving in the military in the 1970s, he trained as a jet and helicopter pilot and became a confident diver.
- He is a keen watercolour painter, a published author, and a music lover, who played the cello at Cambridge. He has done some TV: making a guest appearance on Coronation Street, and presenting the BBC weather forecast.
- As Prince of Wales, he founded nearly 20 charities. Together, they raise £140,000,000 each year for good causes. He is passionate about the environment, speaking out against plastic pollution as early as 1970. He has planted many trees during royal engagements.
- Aged 73, King Charles III is the oldest monarch ever to be crowned in British history.
   He became King on the 8<sup>th</sup> of September 2022, after the death of his mother, the Queen, in Balmoral.
- As head of the Commonwealth, King Charles III is monarch of each of the 14
  Commonwealth realms: Antigua & Barbuda, Australia, Bahamas, Belize, Canada,
  Grenada, Jamaica, New Zealand, Papau New Guinea, Saint Kitts & Nevis, Saint
  Lucia, Saint Vincent & the Grenadines, the Solomon Islands, and Tuvalu. As King,
  he's also the only person in the UK who can travel abroad in the Commonwealth
  without a passport and drive without a licence.
- King Charles III has two children, Princes William and Harry, and five grandchildren.
   Prince William is next in line to become King and was named the Prince of Wales in 2022.

We ask, that, as he is anointed with oil, you will anoint him with your Holy Spirit, so that he will know in his heart, as his mother knew, that Jesus is alive and able to help him fulfil his unique vocation.

We pray that in all the days he serves as King, he will be aware that first and foremost he serves you, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. May his reign be one of wisdom, vision and integrity, inspired by your Kingdom values.

May your name be honoured and glorified throughout this land, Lord, as we pray, *God save the King!* 

#### **Coronation Quiche**

From coronation chicken to platinum pudding, royal occasions demand a signature dish and King Charles III's coronation is no exception. The "coronation quiche" has been personally chosen by the King and Camilla, the Queen Consort, in the hope it will be a centrepiece to many a coronation "Big Lunch" at street parties and community events on the 6<sup>th</sup> of May.

### **Coronation Quiche Recipe**

The recipe says the dish serves six. It also includes double cream.

1 x 20cm flan tin

#### **Pastry**

125g plain flour
Pinch of salt
25g cold butter, diced
25g lard
2 tablespoons milk
Or 1 x 250g block of readymade
shortcrust pastry

#### **Filling**

125ml milk
175ml double cream
2 medium eggs
1 tablespoon chopped fresh tarragon
Salt and pepper
100g grated cheddar cheese
180g cooked spinach, lightly chopped
60g cooked broad beans or soya
beans

#### Method

- To make the pastry: sieve the flour and salt into a bowl; add the fats and rub the mixture together using your finger tips until you get a sandy, breadcrumb-like texture. Add the milk a little at a time and bring the ingredients together into a dough. Cover and allow to rest in the fridge for 30-45 minutes.
- 2. Lightly flour the work surface and roll out the pastry to a circle a little

- larger than the top of the tin and approximately 5mm thick.
- 3. Line the tin with the pastry, taking care not to have any holes or the mixture could leak. Cover and rest for a further 30 minutes in the fridge.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 190°C.
- 5. Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper, add baking beans and bake blind for 15 minutes, before removing the greaseproof paper and baking beans.
- Reduce the oven temperature to 160°C.
- 7. Beat together the milk, cream, eggs, herbs and seasoning.
- 8. Scatter half of the grated cheese in the blind-baked base, top with the chopped spinach and beans and herbs, and then pour over the liquid mixture.
- 9. If required gently give the mixture a delicate stir to ensure the filling is evenly dispersed but be careful not to damage the pastry case.
- 10. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Place into the oven and bake for 20-25 minutes until set and lightly golden.

#### **Beware When the Choirs Meet**

The Rectory Saint James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

You agonised recently over your ecumenical service: who should be invited? Who should preach? What about the order of service? If you had attended our recent combined churches' choir festival, your own dilemmas would have seemed a little less acute.

At the pre-meeting, there was heated discussion about whether those choirs who normally wore robes would be comfortable standing among those who didn't. The more aesthetically sensitive worried whether Saint Agatha's pea green cassocks may clash with our red ones. Intending to be helpful, but phrasing it rather badly, someone suggested that the normally robed choirs should wear nothing. Colonel Wainwright was a little too quick to chuckle.

I began to wonder if a prize was to be awarded to the person who raised the greatest number of concerns: Should the choirs stay separate? Would the tenors be next to the altos or the basses? Where would extra seating be placed? Would the heating be on for the rehearsal? Then came what you would call the 'elephant in the room': of all the choirmasters, who would conduct and who play the organ? Tension mounted, and expressions grew grim. But before the committee started to dig trenches in

my carpet and position howitzers under the desk, I briefly left the room, turned off all the electricity and claimed we'd had a power cut. This is a useful device for truculent committees; sadly, it can be used only rarely.

Come the day, an uneasy truce lasted while everyone adopted the traditional solution to disagreement within congregations, and simply did exactly what they wanted. Some were robed, some were not, some choirs congealed in their own huddles, while others joyfully sat next to people from other churches – mainly so they could point out their neighbour's wrong notes. Some sang in the right key, some sang in the wrong key, some sang what sounded like quite different songs altogether.

The service ended with one choir thinking that the organist had played too loudly, while another choir thought that the conductor wasn't up to much. Everyone agreed afterwards that we must do it again, while firmly stating that if their own choirmaster didn't conduct next year, they wouldn't be there.

Thankfully, one fundamental thing on the day united them: they all said that our church was too cold, and they all went down to the pub afterwards to warm up.

#### **CAP Henley Debt Centre**

Henley Debt Centre to provide our area with the wonderful debt help service of Christian Against Poverty. This is a free service which gets alongside people struggling with unmanageable debt and helps them on the path to becoming debt-free. Debbie Bruwer is the Centre Manager and volunteer benefit holders have been recruited from the four churches who support it (Trinity at Four, Saint Mary's, Christchurch and d:two) to work with individual clients alongside Debbie. The latest move is to set up a Job Club to help local people obtain employment and so boost their income. A Job Club Manager is to be appointed working up to 8 hours a week. A brilliant initiative
